SPEECH OF THE MAHAMAD FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2014

General

Rabbi Joseph Dweck installed as our Senior Rabbi

Rabbi Dweck began his appointment early July 2014 and was installed in a ceremony at Bevis Marks Synagogue on 21 September 2014. We have been delighted to welcome him and his family into our Community.

Review of the year's plans

- To manage the integration of Rabbi Dweck into the Congregation.
 - This has been achieved with a regular programme of attendance at all three synagogues. Rabbi Dweck has introduced an exciting new programme as well as his weekly insight and blog.
- To continue to implement strategies to re-establish fiscal soundness to the communities finances.
 - The growth of future membership numbers is central to the future viability of the community. In order to achieve this, S&P is investing in programme and infrastructure including the new Programme Manager and a new Rabbi at Wembley. The annual deficit of S&P has to date been financed from the existing investment portfolio however a significant fundraising operation is planned to underpin the plans for the next three years.
- To explore with Rabbi Dweck plans for the development of Bevis Marks as a separately funded cultural and educational institution within the S&P Community.
 - A series of 'Culture in the City' events with a working group and sponsorship has been received for these events from city firms.
 - The Brandon Endowment has sponsored the new Programme Manager who is putting a particular emphasis on developing programmes at Bevis Marks.
- Build on the work that has been carried out in recent months in improving the Congregation's IT facilities and systems.
 - 2013/14 has seen the introduction of a new Financial Controller and the full implementation of SAGE as an accounting package. Transition has been difficult as the history is complex, but moving forward we are confident of producing regular monthly accounts. We have now also implemented Shul Cloud, the new membership database and we are now developing it further.

Plans for the coming year

Our priorities for the coming year are :-

- To improve the services we give to members, both new and existing.
- To establish a robust business plan and financial strategy that enables the S&P to grow for the future. This will include a
 fundraising campaign to raise at least £250k per annum.
- To fully engage young people both in terms of an improved Sunday classes programme and children's services.
- To fully engage with young people within the community including the recently introduced newly married programme.
- To grow by at least 50 new members.
- To open the Shulcloud database to members who can then update their own data.
- To rebrand the Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Congregation, ensuring that the community is relevant to future generations.
- To review governance within the Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Congregation ensuring that efficient and effective boards of management and subcommittees are in place.
- To sell Lauderdale Towers.

Membership to complete

During the course of the year we welcomed 53** new members to the Congregation including 29 newly married not previously members. We hope that they will all enjoy a long and happy membership. Unfortunately 23 members passed away during this period. We wish their families many years free from further sorrow. Also 21 members regrettably resigned their membership or were removed from membership. At the end of October we had 1,139 members in total (last year, 1,216*), made up of 803 (845) electors of Lauderdale Road Synagogue (representing 70.50% of the membership), 153 (165) of Wembley Synagogue (representing 13.43% of the membership), 172 (160) of Bevis Marks Synagogue (representing 16.07% of the membership), together with 11 (1) unaffiliated.

- *1216 last year also included 45 Rambam now not part of our membership
- ** For the first time newlyweds not previously members with one year's free membership have been included within the 2013/14 numbers.

Beth Din

 On 27 January 2015 Dayan Saadia Amor zt"l, Rosh Beth Din, sadly passed away. This has led the Mahamad to consider succession plans for the future which will be reported in due course.

SPEECH OF THE MAHAMAD FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2014

We are pleased to share with you the following extracts from reports that have been provided by the Ministers and Committees that run various aspects of the Congregation's activities. Rather than reproduce their reports in full as in previous years, we are this year including only highlights and other key information. We are also this year not reporting on the activities of the various other organisations which have appeared in previous reports but which, while closely associated with the Congregation; do not actually form part of it. Rabbi Dweck

As well as involvement within the S&P and Sephardi Community Rabbi Dweck is delivering Jewish Education across the spectrum.

- Rabbi Dweck was pleased to be a speaker at Campaign Against Anti-Semitism Rally.
- Rabbi Dweck gave the Teshuva Lecture at Holland Park Community in September.
- Various lunch and learn lectures have been given around the city including KPMG, EY, Deutsche Bank and Freshfields.
- A lecture was delivered at Chief Rabbis US / Rabbinic conference at Kinloss.
- A Lecture was also delivered for the Shema Programme in Manchester.
- Lunch and Learn was delivered at various High Schools.
- Rabbi Dweck attended the Tiblisi Rabbinic Conference European Beth Din.
- There have been Shabbat visits by Rabbi Dweck and his family to S&P communities in London and Manchester as well as a special Shabbat in Hendon.
- 10 Days Teshuva Lecture.
- A Shabbat afternoon Shuva lecture series at Lauderdale Road has been introduced.
- Rabbi Dweck is a regular lecturer for the Montefoire Semikah Programme.
- Involvement and attendance at meetings and events as a President of the Council of Christians and Jews.

Bevis Marks

- Bevis Marks Synagogue saw a rise in visitors to a record number close to 8,000. Visitors came from all over the world including The National Trust, NADFAS, U3A, Jewish Heritage, Synagogues and Hebrew Classes.
- 1000 school children of all faiths listened to talks on Judaism in the synagogue, the majority coming from East London Muslim schools and we once again welcomed walkers taking part in Christian Aid "Circle the City" charity walk.
- · Rabbi Dweck's installation service as Senior Rabbi was held in the synagogue.
- The mid-week minyan continues to grow, due in great part to Rabbi Dweck's regular visits.
- A concert was held which was the first event of the newly formed City Business Jewish Group and more events are planned in the near future.
- The synagogue also hosted the extremely moving "Lights Out" event on the eve of Tisha b'Av, which was the Jewish contribution of the nationwide event, to mark the beginning of World War I.
- Isaac Zekaria died on 28th March 2014. He was a stalwart of Bevis Marks, being a member of The Bevis Marks Synagogue
 Committee and the Bevis Marks Synagogue Trust. He was also heavily involved in the restoration of the interior of the
 Synagogue and the Courtyard as well as the Brandon Succah.

Lauderdale Road Synagogue and Rabbi Israel Elia

- Rabbi Elia travelled to Bahrain in May 2014 as a representative of the UK Jewish Community.
- Rabbi Elia participated in meetings of Interfaith Pathway, where discussions between Jews, Christians and Arabs examine local issues.
- Rabbi Farhi led an explanatory service on Yom Kippur.
- There was a ladies' reading of the Megillah on Purim.
- Douglas Murray spoke at the extremely well attended Shabbat Bereshit dinner.
- A special lunch was held for those approaching Bar/Bat Mitzvah.
- 'Made in Heaven' courses were held for engaged couples.
- Several Shabbat lunches were organised for young married and engaged couples.
- During the winter months a new Friday night Kiddush and Parasha Shiur was initiated.
- An evening for the parents of children from Zichron Menachem, an Israeli charity supporting children with cancer, took place during their visit to London.
- A further series of lectures in association with STANDPOINT was held in the Montefiore Hall.

Wembley and Rabbi Kada

- Rabbi Kada has delivered a monthly question and answer session in addition to delivering weekly sermons the rest of the month.
- Children and youth services include a monthly children service run by Tammy Kada and Katie Allen, as well as a monthly
 youth discussion for teenagers.
- There is a bi-weekly Friday night service followed by Kiddush and hot cholent and kugel.
- Monthly Rosh Chodesh Shiur and evening service topics have included Chanukah and Reincarnation.
- Wembley has celebrated two bnei mitzvoth.
- Chanukah Melava Malka with two guest speakers.
- Set up Facebook Page for young married couples.
- · Events included a monthly ladies event organised by Tammy Kada.
- A sushi evening was held at the home of Rabbi Kada with a guest speaker.

- Yoga and Tu Bishvat fruit carving events took place at the synagogue.

- In October there was a Succot lunch for the community, the Hoshana Rabba breakfast in the succah and the Simchat Torah party.
- Also thank you to Joyce Sopher for organising the kiddushim for the congregation. Thank you also to the Committee for their support and help during the year.

Programme Director

Activities included:-

- Shabbat UK there was a large involvement in the organisation, management and promotion of the 700+ people event held at SJW with 6 local communities including Lauderdale Road.
- . An event was held to remember R' Ovadia Yosef, with Dayanim and Rabbanim from across the community.
- Programme included Rabbi Dweck 4 week series on Teshuva.
- There was a communal Selihot Event.
- Specific support has been given to establish Bevis Marks as a cultural centre.

Records and Treasures Committee

- Continues to provide assistance for enquirers and researchers at home and abroad.
- Completed cataloguing the Archives' printed books library.
- Had several articles published in Jewish journals, including Shemot and Jewish Historical Studies (Miriam Rodrigues-Pereira and Edgar Samuel).
- Contributed an account of Sephardi policy towards the poor at an event organised by Clemens Nathan's Foundation (Rachel Montagu).
- Received a small box (found by the Shamash) marked 'belonging to Haham Meldola' containing two non-working watches.
- Received from Sir Stephen Walcy-Cohen three leather-bound volumes of Congregational Publications presented in 1961 to his
 father Sir Bernard Waley Cohen then Lord Mayor and from Basil Jeuda a copy of his publication World War II and Manchester
 Sephardim.

Vestments Committee

- The Committee has continued to maintain and repair the Congregation's Vestments.
- The rosettes were prepared for the Lulabim, and ladies from the Rambam worked with us to make rosettes for their Services, as
 they wish to continue our tradition.
- There is a need to recruit more people who are able to do some work during the day, to continue the extensive work that needs to be done.

- Included allocation of seats for regular attendees at Lauderdale Road.
- The committee is considering simplification of seat allocations for non-seat holders for the Chagim.

Finance Committee Summary 2013-14

- The committee supports the Gabay on financing and budgeting.
- It is intended to extend support for the audit going forward.
- The committee has considered options to fund:
 - o The deficit, which reached £350,000 per annum and is increasing;
 - o The purchase of Vale Close.

 - o Legacies
 - Sale of assets including silver and properties (Lauderdale Towers and Heneage Lane);
 - o Increasing Finta;
 - Cutting costs.

SPEECH OF THE MAHAMAD FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2014

Board of Deputies

- The Board is the body that represents British Jews to government. The S&P send 4 members as deputies to the Board (Dr
 Jeffrey Graham, Jonathan and Simon Sacerdoti, and Anthony Tricot) and one under-35 observer (Sascha Khakshouri).
- There have been a number of developments at the Board of Deputies over the past year that have had an impact on S&P members:
 - o The Board published a Jewish manifesto for the general election which will provide a list of areas for the community to ask candidates for support in areas such as shechita, brit milah and faith schools and to take increased measures to prevent anti-Semitism.
 - o The Board held the centennial commemoration of the start of the First World War at Bevis Marks as part of the nationwide "Lights Out" campaign, with Rabbi Dweck providing the keynote address.
 - O The Board marked the first annual Remembrance Day for Jews from Arab Countries on 30 November. The Board partnered with Harif, the Jewish News and the Israeli Embassy with many S&P members attending.
 - o Following the tragic events in Paris, the Board organised a "#NousSommesJuifs" event, at which Home Secretary, Theresa May and Communities' Secretary, Eric Pickles spoke to reassure the Jewish community that they were doing everything possible to fight anti-Semitism.
- The Board is about to come to the end of its current three-year election cycle, with communities electing new deputies and then
 those deputies electing a new executive.

Cheder

- A very successful new class has been introduced for Year 8's led by Rabbi Dweck.
- Pupils have trained with Jason Silver for participation in Synagogue service.
- Special events have been held throughout the year to celebrate Chagim.

Choir

- The choirmaster has recruited youth and adults into the main synagogue choir at LR.
- He attends Shaare Tikva periodically to teach the children various tunes from main service.
- A concert was held in December involving adults and youth.

Society Of Lavadores

• The society continued to carry out its holy work during the year. We continue to look for both male and female volunteers for this work and the Parnas would be happy to talk to anyone interested in helping.

Objects

The objects of the charity are to continue to provide for the spiritual and welfare needs of the Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Congregation.

Financial review for the year

The Statement of Financial Activities, drafted to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice 2005, shows net outgoing resources for the year on Unrestricted and Designated Funds of £327,824 (2013: incoming resources of £257,819). The net incoming resources on Restricted Funds were £30,442 (2013: £5,203). There were also gains on revaluation of properties and gains on investments assets as detailed in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 18.

A more detailed report on the various activities of the Congregation is highlighted in the Speech of the Mahamad.

Public benefit statement

The sections of this report as highlighted in the Speech of the Mahamad sets out Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue's objectives and reports on the activity and successes in the year to 31 October 2014, as well as explaining the plans for the current financial year. Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue's work benefits the individual members of the Congregation and there is interaction between the statutory sector and the voluntary and community sector in the UK.

The Mahamad has considered this matter and concluded:

- That the aims of the organisation continue to be charitable;
- 2. That the aims and the work done give identifiable benefits to the charitable sector and both indirectly and directly to individuals in need;
- 3. That the benefits are for the public, are not unreasonably restricted in any way and certainly not by ability to pay; and
- 4. That there is no detriment or harm arising from the aims or activities.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the Charity to maintain the free reserves, that is unrestricted (and undesignated) funds less tangible fixed assets, of the Charity at a level which equates to between three and six months unrestricted (and undesignated) expenditure. This would provide sufficient funds to cover management, administration and running costs for the Charity.

The free reserves of the Charity are currently below this level. In order to achieve the stated level of reserves within the next three years, the Mahamad continue to implement cost cutting measures and review income generation.

Risk review

The Mahamad has established four areas of potential risk:

1. Operational

Proper security is in place to enable the Synagogue to continue as such. Satisfactory arrangements have been made for the administration of the community, and the new Rabbi was appointed in July 2014.

2. Governance

The Mahamad pursues an active policy of encouraging younger members to join the Board of the Congregation, thereby ensuring that there will be adequate succession in the management of the Synagogue. The new governance policy (Ascamot) which was approved by the yehidim in 2012 is in place.

3. Financial

Proper control procedures exist to ensure that all transactions are authorised and that expenditure is incurred only where absolutely essential. All the Synagogue's assets are properly safeguarded and insurance levels are constantly reviewed.

4. Legislative

The Mahamad uses high quality experts to advise on all legislative issues, and the Synagogue complies with and co-operates with all authorities in all respects.

Recruitment, induction and training of Trustees

1. Recruitment of Trustees

Trustees are currently recruited both by word of mouth, and also by advertising vacancies among the membership of the Congregation (the population from which the Ascamot say that the trustees may be drawn). Such advertising is conducted in accordance with the Ascamot, with any nominations needing to be appropriately seconded and transmitted to the Chief Executive.

2. Appointment of Trustees

Trustees may be directly elected, or ex-officio by virtue of their position on a constituent committee of the Congregation (including the Mahamad, which itself is elected by the members of the Congregation). The Ascamot covers all elections.

3. Induction of Trustees

New Trustces are generally furnished with recent minutes of relevant meetings, and encouraged to discuss any matters with any other Elder, or with the Chief Executive.

New members of the Mahamad are furnished with recent minutes of relevant meetings, and invited to observe one or two Mahamad meetings prior to their taking office. They are encouraged to discuss matters with other members of the Mahamad, Board and the Chief Executive.

4. Training of Trustees

The Mahamad recognises that the responsibilities of a Trustee are considerable. Training sessions will be arranged as the need

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2014

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention modified to include the revaluation of investments, in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice on Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005). The charity has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No.1 from the requirement to produce a Cash Flow Statement on the grounds of its size.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Charities Act 2011.

1.2 Incoming resources

Contributions from Yehidim and Congregants

Finta assessed for the year commencing on or about 1 April is apportioned to the respective accounting periods on the basis that five twelfths is deemed to relate to the period after 31 October and is treated as deferred income. Tax recoverable continues to be accounted for in the year in which the related finta is received.

Other Incoming Resources

Donations, legacies and other forms of voluntary income are recognised as incoming resources when receivable, except insofar as they are incapable of financial measurement.

Investment Income

Investment income has been included to the extent that it arises on the fixed asset investments held during the year. Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis, inclusive of value added tax.

Charitable Expenditure

Charitable expenditure comprises all expenditure directly relating to the objectives of the Synagogue.

Governance Costs

Governance costs include audit costs and legal advice for the trustees and those costs associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Support Costs

The amounts disclosed under each of the above categories comprise those costs which are directly attributed to that category. Support costs are those costs that are not directly attributable to a single activity but provide the necessary organisational support for all the charity's activities. The support costs have all been allocated to the charity's sole activity - "Religious, Educational and Social" purposes.

1.4 Fixed assets

Ministers' residencies used for the purposes of the Charity

The residences are at current market valuations as shown in note 11.

Movable property

Expenditure on Synagogue furnishings, pictures, books, etc. is written off in the year incurred. Office furniture and equipment is shown in the Balance Sheet at cost less depreciation at the rate of 20% per annum on a straight line basis and written off over five years.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS (CONTINUED)

1 Accounting Policies

(Continued)

Heritage Assets

The cost of these assets (as described in note 12) has previously been written off against reserves. These assets are integral to the activities of the Congregation and are unique in terms of their religious and historic significance. Conventional valuation techniques cannot be applied because of their uniqueness and any valuation would be misleading.

1.5 Investment properties

Investment properties are included in the balance sheet at current values as shown in note 13.

1.6 Investments

Investments are held in the name of the Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue Common Investment Fund (also known as The London Sephardi Trust Investment Pool) as custodian trustee and are included in the financial statements at market value at the Balance Sheet date.

1.7 Pensions

The Charity operates a defined contributions pension scheme. Contributions are charged in the accounts as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

The regular cost of providing retirement pensions and related benefits is charged to the statement of financial activities over the employees' service lives on the basis of a constant percentage of earnings. Any difference between the charge to the statement of financial activities and the contributions paid to the scheme is shown as an asset or liability in the balance sheet.

1.8 Constituent Synagogues

There are three constituent synagogues at Bevis Marks, Lauderdale Road and Forty Avenue, Wembley.

1.9 Funds

The accounts are prepared showing unrestricted, designated and restricted funds. Unrestricted funds are deployed for the general purposes of the charity but where there has been a decision of the Trustees to commit funds for a particular purpose e.g. for the purchase of fixed assets, these amounts are shown as designated funds and not currently available for general expenditure.

Restricted funding is deployed in agreement with individual funders for agreed purposes and are only available for those specified purposes. Where the expenditure on a project or programme exceeds the amount of the restricted funding available, the shortfall stands to be made up by a transfer from unrestricted funds.

Two of our ecclesiatical officers (Ministers) occupy residential accommodation owned by the Synagogue under housing licences.

These licenses permit the Ministers to remain in their current Synagogue dwellings (during which the Synagogue will cover the cost of rates, service charges and repairs) until 5 years after their retirement date, or until age 75, whichever comes first. At this point, they will be entitled to alternative accommodation, which will be provided until the later death of the Minister or their spouse.

One of these Ministers moved into their alternative accommodation during the year, which was purchased by the Synagogue. Therefore the Synagogue will continue to cover the cost of rates, service charge and repairs for this Minister. The other Minister is yet to retire, and once in alternative accommodation, the Synagogue will cover the cost of the respective rent to third party landlords.

A provision has been made in the accounts to reflect the present value of the costs of fulfilling these future obligations, with the movement in this provision reflected in the current accounting period (see note 4).

The Jewish Memorial Council Pension Fund, a defined benefit multi-employer scheme of approximately 30 participating employers and 200 members, had been closed to future accruals from 31 December 2010. At that date, 3 employees of the Synagogue were members of the Scheme. All contributing employers are jointly and severably liable to make good any deficit arising on the Scheme. In the year to 31 October 2013, due to the estimated deficit of the Fund, it was deemed prudent to include a provision of £38,000 in the accounts. As at the year end 31 October 2014, the deficit has now converted to a surplus and therefore it is deemed appropriate to release the provision this year.

22 Related parties

As at 31 October 2014, Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue was owed £39,916 (2013: £36,263) by the Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue Common Investment Fund (an associated entity of Spansh and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue with common trustees, also known as The London Sephardi Trust Investment Pool Fund), in which all quoted investment of Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue were held as at 31 October 2014 and 31 October 2013. Investment income received during the year from those investments amounted to £79,270 (2013: £96,714). In addition, Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue owed £23,107 (2013: £300,000) to the Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue Common Investment Fund. The charity was also owed nil (2013: £80,000) by Spanish & Portuguese Jews' Home for the Aged.

In addition, the charity owed £43,237 (2013: £18,249) to the Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Burial Society - Hebrat Guernilut Hasadim.

The charity was owed £12,500 (2013: £12,500) by the London Board for Shechita, an associated charity of which Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue is one of three parent bodies. During the year, the charity received an annual payment from the London Board for Shechita of £15,000 (2013: £15,000) for ecclesiastical services provided.

Included within note 7 to the accounts are Contributions from Associated Trusts, entities which are connected with the charity by virute of common trustees or being part of the Spanish and Portuguese Jews' Synagogue group, and represent fees for secretarial and accounting services of £69,200 (2013: £64,804) receivable from:
